



APA Documentation for Reference List Practice Sheet

-PLEASE NOTE: All citations should be double-spaced-

► An Article from an Online Database (ex: SIRS or EBSCO articles)

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Date of Publication). Title of Article. *Title of Journal Italicized*. *Volume number Italicized*(issue), page number(s). Retrieved month day, year, from Name of Online database.

Example: Dundee, C. (1984). Emu Bites and Crocodile Filets: Yummy Australian Wildlife. *Aussie Life Today*, 13(1), 16-23. Retrieved December 20, 2002, from SIRS Researcher database.

► A Book with One Author

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Date of Publication). *Title of Book Italicized*. City of Publication: Publisher Name.

Example: Homemaker, S. (1957). *A Thousand and One Tasty Jell-O Molds*. Schenectady: Random House.

► An Article in a Journal

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Date of Publication). Title of Journal Article. *Name of Journal Italicized*, *Volume number of Journal Italicized*(issue), page number(s).

Example: Pigpen, J. (1977). Mud Pies Aren't Just for Dessert Anymore. *The Peanuts Magazine*, 32(3), 55-61.

► An Article in a Daily Newspaper

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Year, Month Day of Publication). Title of Newspaper Article. *Name of Newspaper Italicized*, p. or pp. Section and page number(s).

Example: Filloseebagoomba, P. (1966, April 12). Cannibalism and the Single Savage. *Papua-New Guinea Times*, pp. B1, B6.

► An Article in an Online Magazine

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Year of Publication). Title of Online Article. *Name of Online Journal Italicized*. Retrieved Month Day, Year, from <Electronic Address>

Example: Willy, C. (2000). 15 Minute Krill Hors D'Ouvres & Canapés. *The Penguin Party Planner*. Retrieved February 2, 2000, from <http://www.ppp.net>

► A Website

Last Name of Author, Initial only of First Name. (Year, Month Day of Publication). *Name of Website Italicized*. Retrieved Month Day, Year, from <Electronic Address>

Example: Katt, K. (2004, November 22). *Finicky and Proud*. Retrieved June 21, 2007, from <http://www.catsuberalles.com>

Important Notes:

- If there is more than one author, start with the author that is first listed in the text. Then add the other author's name(s) using an ampersand instead of the word "and". Ex: Wigglesworth, Q., & Szelechnikov, F.
- List editors' names as if they were authors, but follow the last name with "(Eds.)"—or "(Ed.)" with only one editor. Note the periods inside and outside the final parenthesis.
- Use the abbreviation "p." or "pp." before the page numbers in books and in newspapers. Do not use the abbreviation for journals and magazines. For inclusive page numbers, include all figures: "667–668."
- Consult the 6th edition of *A Writer's Reference* by Diana Hacker or the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* for further referencing.
- **PLEASE NOTE:** Your references should begin on a new page after your essay. You should label this page **References** (with no quotation marks, underlining, etc.), centered at the top of the page.
